

## **November meeting recap**

Members joined Elana Marais in person and online to learn about the secretary bird that frequents grass lands of South Africa and other African countries. It is quite an unusual bird of prey as it walks rather than flies for much of the time. Nests are built in flimsy trees and are reused every year. The young spend many months with the parents before becoming independent. Elena had the interesting task of becoming very familiar with various skulls of rodents and insect wings as she pulled apart the birds excreted pellets to see what their most common food sources were. The birds will often nest in trees on farmland and are not perturbed by farm machinery coming close to their nests. Thanks Elana for such an interesting talk.

# Sudden death of past Waikato Regional Representative Bruce Postil

We were sad to hear of the passing of our immediate past regional representative Bruce Postil on the second of January. Bruce was found unconscious in his villa in Christchurch and passed away a few hours later with his 2 daughters in attendance aged 79 years. Bruce had been involved in conservation for a large number of years at Mount Cook, the West Coast and Waikato. Some of you will remember he was involved with the Pūkorokoro Miranda Shorebird Centre and with the flyaways that the godwits use and went to North Korea for this work as a volunteer. Closer to home as regional representative led the harbour censuses at Kawhia, Raglan and Aotea harbours for a number of years which have been going for over 40 years.

## Harbour bird census February 15-16

The annual summer harbour bird census of Aotea, Kawhia and Raglan harbours will be taking place the weekend 15-16th of February with bad weather back up dates of 1-2 March. The important work we do feeds into the national census data kept on migratory and local birds and helps us see the trends in bird numbers. The census is done by boat and by land and some observers are dropped off at different hard to access points on the harbours.

We are short on volunteers and may have to cancel if we don't have enough people. If you have never joined a census I would encourage you to do so. This is an activity open to birders of all levels. ## **Hamilton Lake Survey Results**

Barry reports lake levels were normal and despite a few of the regular birds missing there were plenty of other birds to count. The Canada Geese were spread out far and wide, the maximum count was 108, not as many as previous months. They were in areas where we don't often see them – at the start of our walk by the restaurant. The high light of the day was the number of shags around the lake – also in various places and all four species present. Lots of goldfinches but no starlings that were counted last month. ## **Tutukaka pelagic birding trip November - Poor Knights Isl**

7 members signed up for the November Petrel Station pelagic boat tour with Scott Brooks. We had perfect weather and were lucky enough to witness 2 'boilups' where the fish are having a feeding frenzy and attract huge number of birds. Scott is passionate about seabirds and he counted over 100,000 that day. Nick was delighted to see a small number of grey ternlet (blue-grey noddy) on a rock stack. Petrels, shearwaters and prions were in large numbers but unfortunately the albatross were absent that day and we only got a distant glimpse of a white capped mollymawk but despite the distance its colossal wings were impressive. We all agreed that it was an amazing day out.

## Many more bird fossil species named

An astonishing eleven new fossil bird species were named from Aotearoa during 2022 and 2023. Four of these already had entries in NZ Birds Online. Publication of the 6th edition checklist prompted publication of pages for the other seven: <u>Bannockburn swan</u>, <u>Zealandian tropicbird</u>, <u>Fordyce's penguin</u>, <u>Stonehouse's penguin</u>, <u>Wilson's penguin</u>, <u>Hakataramea albatross</u>, and <u>Tina's giant petrel</u>.

## **Spoonbill census**


Spoonbills were seen nesting on Lake Kimihia in mid December and some birds were seen flying into nesting sites with nesting material. Local farmer Derry Hedley was a great help allowing us to survey the lake from his house. He is a keen birder himself and notes that the spoonbills in the past have nested on top of the duck shooting hides.


