Ornithological Snippets

A Shining Cuckoo/Pīpīwharauroa chick with Grey Warbler/Riroriro foster parent was seen at Swampy Summit on 16 February. There have been more sightings of Weka around Dunedin, this time in NE Valley in late January.

2 **South Island Pied Oystercatcher/Tōrea** were reported in Queenstown on 10 February, and 3 in the Remarkables on 15 & 16. A **Common Diving-Petrel/Kuaka** flying across Lake Wanaka on 1 February was unexpected

A late report is of a Laughing Kookaburra at Glenore, near Milton, on 1 December. A Kaka/Kākā was at Lake Hayes Estate on 11/12 February, and a Red-crowned Parakeet/Kākāriki was heard at Otanomomo, near Balclutha, on 15 February. Eastern Rosella/Kākā uhi whero was recorded from Palmerston on 8 February, and also in the Puerua Valley early in the month.

Tomtit/Miromiro was seen at both Otanomomo and Awakiki Bush on 15 February, with no previous records of the species at either location.

Finally there have been 2 translocations in the region recently. 18 **South Island Takahe**/ **Takahē** were released in the Rees Valley on 11 February, including an Orokonui-raised bird, and 51 **South Island Saddleback/Tieke** were liberated at Orokonui on 25 January.

Note that no banded dotterels were seen, and numbers of bar-tailed godwits were similar to the previous two summer counts.


Looking at past years I wonder what made the summer of 2021 such a good season for pied stilts?

Notes from the Regional Representative

On 2 February, I lead a group of 10 birders (new and learning) with the Whakatipu Wildlife Trust in a birding outing from the Twelve Mile Delta to Bobs Cove. The morning's highlights were hearing a shining cuckoo and seeing a tui fly onto a nest above one of the local trapping group traps. Later in the morning during a snack break, a Black shag/ Māpunga flew past at close quarters giving the group an excellent view of its black plumage and yellow skin around the base of bill and eyes.



I was also privileged along with Oscar Thomas and Ela Hunt to witness the release of takahe into the Rees Valley along with a large gallery of people involved in supporting the achievement of this incredible milestone in the recovery of this species. The takahe will be monitored by the staff of the Southern Lakes Sanctuary.

Otago Branch projects for 2025

Our dedicated committee met via Zoom on the 19 February and have agreed the 2025 Branch Projects.

Bittern / Crake Inventory project with the Matuku Muster at a few sites where bittern are confirmed (subject to the capacity of members to lead). Analysing the data from the project is the primary focus of 2025. Details of Matuku Muster opportunities will be provided closer to the time (August/ September).

Town Belt Project An annual public 5MBC will be run in Oct/ Nov. Data from the Town Belt will be shared with DCC, Sanctuary City and Town Belt Kaitiaki (if the project is confirmed to continue).


Episode 13 of Rewinding in Action
